Social Justice Matters

The end of the first month of the Obama administration is much too early to start judging how well it's doing—at this point we can do little more than hope. But it might be interesting to look at the views of Rabbi Michael Lerner, editor of *Tikkun* magazine and founder of the Network of Spiritual Progressives. Early in the Obama campaign he called Obama a spiritual progressive, and the current issue of *Tikkun* has a number of "memos to Obama" on various topics (see www.Tikkun.org). Lerner's book *The Left Hand of God* does a good job of articulating the overall idea (but not so much the specific goals or methods for reaching them) of a social-justice-inspired country—a "New Bottom Line for American Society" in which the standards of judgment for everything from personal behavior to corporations and legislation are not primarily efficiency, productivity, or even rationality as narrowly construed, but also include "how much love and kindness, generosity and caring for others, and ethical and ecological sensitivity have been generated . . . how much we've increased our capacities to recognize others as embodiments of the sacred" (Lerner's words). This viewpoint sees money and power not as values in themselves, but at best as enablers, in that they make the realization and spread of real values possible.

How much of this will be possible during the recession is a good question—at least the first two years of the first term may be a period of rescue rather than progress. But how nice it is to hear the word "liberal" coming slowly back into public use in tones of respect instead of contempt!

Meanwhile in our congregation, look for more action on the Empowerment Process, by which we choose social justice projects that the Society can support, in the next couple of months.

I took a break from meetings and writing and phone calls and other assorted busyness to stop and flip through some of the poems you have been sending me over the past couple weeks. I opened randomly, and ended up with this one, which seems ever-so appropriate to share with you at this moment in the life of our congregation.

It is called, “The Way It Is”, by William Stafford.

*There's a thread that you follow. It goes among things that change. But it doesn't change.
People wonder about what you are pursuing.
You have to explain about the thread.
But it is hard for others to see.
While you hold it you can't get lost.
Tragedies happen; people get hurt or die; and you suffer and get old.
Nothing you do can stop time's unfolding.
You don't ever let go of the thread.*

I love Stafford's image of a through-running thread. Things do change, life does move and the world of our youth can often seem like a forgotten world when we look back at it. And so it is with us, always growing, changing, loving, fearing, falling and rising—and sometimes it can be hard to recognize our own faces in the mirror—or to find ourselves in the time-faded photographs on our parents' mantle.

But even so, there is always a thread. Always. The trick is to know it. To see it. To hold it consciously, wide awake.

Here we sit on the edge of so much change, so much hope and so much anxiety. If there has ever been a time when it is important for us to hold onto our essential thread—that time is now.

What is it that makes you, distinctly you? What is it that makes this congregation, distinctly us? Let us reflect on this, and follow our thread into the future with our eyes wide open and hope and anticipation in our hearts.
