Voting Information:

- Members who have signed the membership book on or before May 13, 2010 and committed to an annual financial contribution are eligible to vote.
- Absentee ballots will be available on request by calling the office at 965-4583, or at the Town Meeting on June 6, 2010.
- Members may vote by proxy. Each member attending the meeting may hold one proxy. Proxies should be dated, signed and state the name of the member to carry the proxy.
- The quorum for an annual meeting is one-fifth of the membership counted at present or voting by proxy or absentee ballot. The agenda may be changed if a quorum of one-third of the membership is counted as present.
- We have 472 members at the time of this notice: a quorum of 95 members will be required to conduct the meeting and 158 members to change the agenda.

More Sundays Needed

We had a great turn out, enthusiastic participants, easily made the quorum and got our business completed in record time! Got to like getting business done and having fun in the process.

Your vote in person, by proxy or absentee is important so please vote (as they say in Chicago "early and often!"). So whether you attend or not, please make sure your voice is heard. Vote! Absentee ballots and proxies are available in the Garden and through the office of the Administrator. I look forward to seeing you at the annual meeting.

Notes on 2010-2011 Proposed Budget

Operating Revenue

- **Fundraising Activity: Pledge and Contributions Revenue** based upon current year projections and known commitments to current annual campaign. Contributions are plate collections to operating fund. **Fundraising Revenue** is based upon current year projections and next year's plans. Service auction will be held in fall. Smaller fundraisers include Brunch Breaks and Women's Fashion Fling.

- **Business Activity: Facilities Revenue** based upon known contracts and current year projections. This item includes rental for house at 124 E. Arrellaga and schools, weddings and other room use.

- **Investment Activity: Investment Revenue** is from Endowment, and minor portion from savings interest. **Cummins Revenue** is an annual gift from the estate of Roy and Laurie Cummins designated by the board and congregation for facility maintenance and program support. Separate percentage of this gift also funds our 2008 Building Project Capital Campaign.

Operating Expenses

- **Staff Expense** includes addition of part-time Youth Coordinator, and part-time program support; adjustments in pension benefit for 2 employees eligible after 1 year of employment; cost-of-living adjustment for staff; projected increase in health insurance costs and sabbatical accrual.

- **Facilities Expense** includes insurance for property and liability; regular maintenance, major maintenance, contract services for gardening, custodial and security services, utilities, supplies, and organ maintenance, and similar to previous years, earthquake self-insurance accrual (\$9,000/year).

- **Administration Expense** includes computers, telephone, bookkeeping, office equipment leases, supplies, postage and newsletter.

- **Supplements to Programs** include program supplies costs and board expenses, as well as funding for leadership development and membership outreach. Some additional program supplements are funded from existing donor-restricted funds.

- **District and Association Support** is projected to be one-half full Fair Share to UUA and full share to PSWD, based on official membership reported on February 1, 2010.

- **Interest Expense** is interest on 2008 Building Project Loans.

- **Additional Minister Search** is support for selection expenses during 2010-2011 for anticipated hire of additional minister in August 2011.

And here is some detail on the accommodations:

The camp was built as a summer camp, so many of the cabins have two or three bunk beds in them (total of four or six beds) and are rustic but comfortable in terms of temperature.

These are good for families. Several of the cabins also have rooms with one double bed—good for couples. There's even a "luxury" cabin with fridge and microwave. These rooms go fast, so registering earlier will ensure you getting one of those.

Violinist Nicole McKenzie and Pianist Betty Oberacker

Violinist Nicole McKenzie and pianist Betty Oberacker will play the three Violin and Piano Sonatas of Johannes Brahms, sublime expressions of the composer's most romantic and personal creativity. Ranging from luxuriantly lyrical to passionately dramatic, the sonatas were written over a span of ten years, 1878–1888. The richly melodic character that permeates these works has endeared them to performers and audiences alike, and the superb balance and interplay of writing for violin and piano is unsurpassed in the entire literature.

Nicole McKenzie, violinist, earned a BM Degree from Oberlin Conservatory and her MM Degree from Florida State University. Winner of the Sutton Chamber Music Award, Ms. McKenzie is active as soloist and chamber musician, teaches for Sandcastle Music Together and the Santa Barbara Charter School, and also maintains a private violin studio.

Betty Oberacker, pianist, has toured throughout Europe, Israel, Asia, Australia, New Zealand, Mexico and the U.S. Acclaimed for her interpretations of both traditional and contemporary repertoire, many noted contemporary composers have written works for her. Dr. Oberacker taught for many years at UCSB and has recorded for Century, Klavier, MMC, Orion and VMM Records. She has been Artist-in-Residence at leading festivals, conservatories and universities worldwide, and maintains an active performance, teaching and chamber music coaching schedule. She often performs in the Santa Barbara Music Club concerts.

Tickets will be available at the door. Donations to benefit the Santa Barbara Charter School are general \$15, seniors \$10 and students are free! Betty and Nicole will play that morning at the worship services as well.

Lifespan Religious Education News

Be a Part of Something really ... **Amazing!**

We are currently recruiting teachers for next year's Religious Education program. Here are some often-asked questions about teaching in our RE program.

Do RE teachers ever get to go to the service?

We like to staff each class with three teachers. This ensures that our teachers lead a class no more than once a month and assist once a month. The last Sunday of the month, children attend a children's worship service in Jefferson Hall. This fall we will also be blessed with "Kid for A Day" volunteers in every class. RE classes are only during the 9:30 service.

How long is the commitment?

Because teaching is such an amazing commitment and gift to our community, we like to give our teachers breaks throughout the church year. Our classroom schedule for the 2010–2011 church year is September through November with the entire month of December off. RE classes resume for Spring in January and continue through February—then you are finished! During the months of March, April, and May our children will be involved in our arts program and social justice projects that are led by volunteers. If you do the math, you will see that the total teaching commitment is for five months—that means you will teach only five times and assist five times during the entire church year. Pretty easy!

What do I have to do to prepare?

You receive training and a well-planned curriculum. You will need to read through the lesson you are leading to familiarize yourself with it and plan to arrive at 9:00 AM on the one Sunday a month you are leading the class to prepare the room. If specific materials are needed (such as for an art project or handouts), they are usually waiting for you in your classroom on Sunday morning.

What if I don't know very much about Unitarian Universalism?

Teaching children's RE is a great way to learn! You can explore the seven principles, sources, and history of Unitarian Universalism along with your class. And you will be putting your faith into action by teaching. I guarantee you will learn at LEAST as much as the kids.

What if I can't get through the whole lesson?

We encourage teachers to be flexible and creative. If your class is absorbed in a great discussion about one aspect of the lesson or totally engaged in a project, go with it! An inspired, interested group of kids is more important than completing any one particular lesson. Likewise, teachers are encouraged to use their own creativity to bring life to the lessons. If you think of a great project (art, theater, science, game, music, etc.) that enhances the lesson you're leading, we encourage you to go with that. An inspired teacher inspires students.

What about classroom management?

Classroom management and guidance techniques will be covered in the teacher training. There will always be at least two adults in a class. If a problem persists, staff are on hand to assist you.

Can anyone teach?

We consider the best possible matches for each class. Teachers must also have child abuse clearance through background checks or other means.

Count me in! How do I sign-up?

Contact LeeAnn or Charla in the Religious Education office. You can also stop by the RE table in Parish Garden on Sundays. Please let us know which grade you are interested in teaching and if you are available for the teacher training on August 28th. If you're interested in teaching, but not able to attend the training, we'll work something out to prepare you.

The Connection Circle Shuffle

I can't believe it is June already. The months seem to have flown by!

Way back in September, over 90 of you signed up to join a Connection Circle, a small group that would meet twice a month for a time of deep sharing and listening on the worship theme of the month, led by a trained and carefully chosen facilitator.

As the year went on, more and more people joined Circles, and our program has grown. Pretty much every Sunday, participants tell me what a difference their Circle is making in their lives, and I am thrilled to see so many people developing deep, loving, trusting relationships with people they may never have even met otherwise!

Connection Circles and other small groups ministries are at the very heart of our congregation's mission, for it is through learning, sharing and growing together that hearts are opened and lives are changed, week by week and month by month.

And listening lies at the heart of every Connection Circle. We live in a society that tends to favor talking over listening

and action over silence—and yet it is only in the safety and respectful silence of listening that our souls, our shy and oh so timid souls, as Parker Palmer calls them—can rise to the surface and speak.

In this way, the seemingly pedestrian act of listening is a sacred act, and can become a deep and irreplaceable spiritual practice. In a society like ours, where, as novelist Milan Kundera puts it, so many of us spend the vast majority of our listening time simply waiting for our chance to speak again—what more precious gift can we possibly give another human being than the rare gift of our deep listening?

If you are currently in a Connection Circle, I hope you will sign up again. If you are not in a group right now, I hope you will consider joining one. I know it can be a little scary, but believe me—it's worth it!

What began as one man's environmental experiment quickly becomes an experiment in how much one woman is willing to sacrifice for her husband's dreams. Laura Gabbert and Justin Schein's film provides both a front-row seat into the experiment that became a national fascination and media sensation, and a behind-the-scenes look at the marital challenges that result from Colin and Michelle's radical lifestyle change.
