## People From the Purple Haze

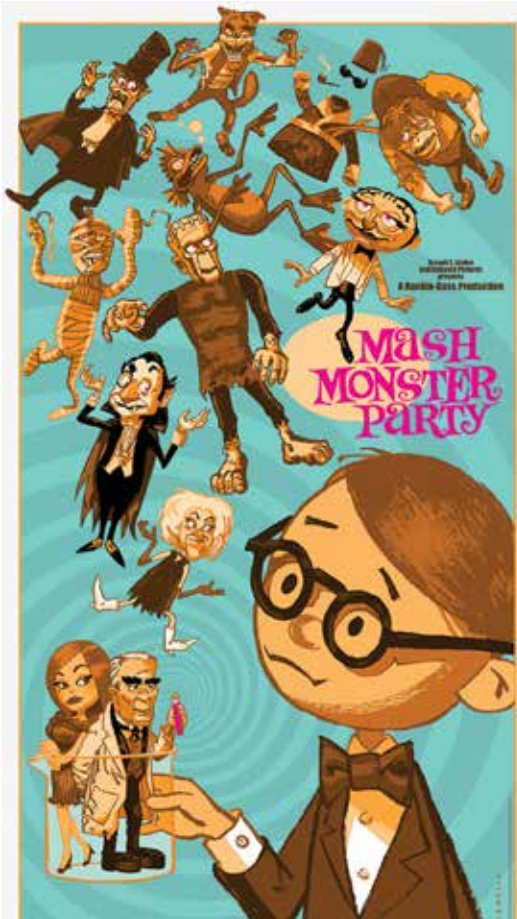
A drab manila file overflows with pale lavender papers. I open the folder and discover a multitude of humans, trapped inside a form, lives recorded in words on a sheet of checked boxes, one-word handwritten missives and circled words. What is this? In my first week as Director of Congregational Life, I'd discovered the archive of New Member Interest Inventory that every new USSB member fills out, while re-organizing my desk and files. But these weren't just outdated paperwork. In reality, reading over those past forms was like uncovering some lost voices from a distant tribe, personas and passions from the past trapped inside bureaucratic forms. From May 2013, one member lists a special skill as “habitat creation in my garden” while another in 2012 lists “Ethnomusicology, geography, jazz, global culture, oral history” as their occupation. Another, in 2010, simply writes “RN/MFT/Mom,” using three slashes to contain the depth of one person with three lofty and equally important and difficult job titles. Each page piqued my curiosity further and I kept reading, finding no answers or patterns, just allowing each distinct person's point of view to emerge from the page. This process of starting to see distinctive people emerge from an apparent sea of sameness is a metaphor



for the experience that I've had meeting and getting to know all of you. I look forward to learning your passions, your curiosities, what annoys you and what serves you best. This gentle unfolding is not unlike reading these forms: charming and old-fashioned and time-consuming. There is no digital shortcut for meeting people, serving them, attending to their needs and discovering their true selves. I am honored to have this job, right now, to get to know this vast and distinctive sea of people who make up the Unitarian Society of Santa Barbara. ## Library Corner

Your library committee hopes that you had some time to indulge in a good book or movie this summer. My favorite was *A Gentleman in Moscow* by Amor Towles.

Here are our reviews:

### The Movie:

#### Master and Commander: The Far Side of the World

In 1805, aboard the H.M.S. Surprise, the brash Capt. Jack Aubrey (Russell Crowe) and his trusted friend, the ship's scholarly surgeon, Stephen Maturin (Paul Bettany) are ordered to hunt down and capture a powerful French vessel off the South American coast. The film centers on the spirits of the two men.

Capt. Aubrey is a strong but fair leader of men, a brilliant strategist who does not go by the books. He studies, but does not coddle his men, and his abilities save the Surprise at one crucial moment and win a battle at another.

Maturin is cool under pressure, directing a critical medical procedure on himself using a mirror. His passion is biology, and he hopes the Navy will take him to places where there are beetles and birds unknown to science.

The story takes place almost entirely onboard the Surprise, a smaller ship and outgunned by the French warship Acheron. Scenes at sea are harrowing and ferocious, especially during battles.

This movie is based on the novels of Patrick O'Brian and recreates the world of the British Navy around 1805 with much detail and intensity. The movie was directed by Peter Weir and released in 2003.

Some of my favorite scenes were of the captain and the surgeon playing classical duets on violin and cello, and also when their friendship was tested and they ended up in the Galapagos Islands.



### The Book:

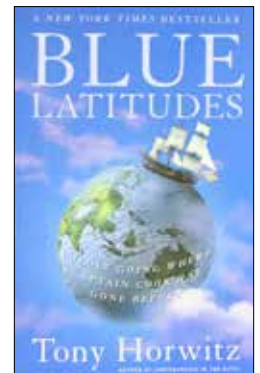
#### Blue Latitudes: Boldly Going Where Captain Cook Has Gone Before By Tony Horwitz

This book is both a biography of Capt. James Cook, the renowned eighteenth-century British explorer, and a travel narrative. Cook is widely considered one of the greatest navigators in maritime history. His three epic journeys were the last great voyages of discovery. When he embarked for the Pacific in 1768 a third of the globe remained blank. By the time he died in 1779 during a bloody clash in Hawaii, the map of the world was substantially complete.

Horwitz tells his own story of following Cook's wake, accompanied by a carousing Australian friend, as they visited Cook's far-flung destinations (except Antarctica). The author paces the book by skillfully intertwining his own often hilarious adventures with tales of Cook and his men, who accomplished amazing feats on land and on the seas.

Originally published in 2002, this entertaining book will please fans of history, exploration, and travelogues.

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## October Outreach Offering: Transition House

Transition House is an emergency shelter and anti-poverty program for families with children in Santa Barbara, providing services to address the cycle of poverty-based family homelessness. Each year, Transition House helps 150 homeless families with children and 50 families that are at risk for homelessness acquire the tools necessary for self-sufficiency. With the support of case managers, parents are empowered to find work that pays a living wage, save money, develop life skills, and secure permanent housing for their families. Transition House is the only homelessness organization in Santa Barbara that exclusively serves families with children.

Transition House was founded by a consortium of faith communities in 1984. For the first two years of its existence,

homeless families and individuals were housed in local church basements and fellowship halls — moving from one congregation to the next every 30 days. Currently, Transition

House operates an emergency shelter at 434 E. Ortega Street, a second-stage transitional housing unit called the “Firehouse,” and 35 units of permanent, affordable, supportive housing.

Approximately 70 percent of homeless families who enter Transition House’s emergency shelter program succeed in transitioning into

permanent housing. That is a truly significant indication of the program’s success.

# Vegan Film Night October 26

**A**ustrian-produced H.O.P.E. (Healing of Planet Earth) presents *What You Eat Matters* to address the effects of a typical Western diet on human health, the environment, and animals. Half of the population in Western society suffers from being overweight. Cardio-vascular diseases, diabetes, and cancer are epidemic. Meat consumption has quintupled over the past 50 years, and 65 billion land animals are being slaughtered every year for food consumption. One third of the global grain production is fed to animals for fattening, while 1.8 billion people worldwide suffer from hunger and starvation. Can there be a solution to these problems? Suggesting that there can be and is, the film's message is that by changing our eating habits, we can change the world.
